# Rural Crime:

This quarter has seen a 3% decrease in reported rural and wildlife crime compared to last quarter.



We have more recently noticed an increase in hare coursing across the county. We encourage the reporting of this issue. The team are working hard to educate officers across the board around this issue, its impact, and the legislation they can utilise to deal with it effectively. A reminder that all crime should be reported to help the team gather information and intelligence to tackle

such issues, knowing where and when the problem is occurring. Don't forget, hare coursing in progress needs to be reported through to police on 999.

# Policing Operations

Our team has been committed to working on the issues that most affect the rural community. These issues vary and sometimes are dependent on the time of the year. Over the past few months we have been working hard to re-enforce messages around **livestock worrying**, fly tipping, road safety, amongst other daily work.

#### **Operation Snaffle**

The team came together with members of LFRS, mounted volunteers and the Road Safety Team, to undertake Operation Snaffle in . The operation identifies drivers, driving too close or passing too fast to horses on the road. The identified drivers are then given the chance to watch an impactful VR video with LFRS, education is key!



#### **Operation Recall**



Livestock worrying is an increasing concern as lambing season is round the corner. Last year there was a marked increase Nationally in attacks on livestock. Leicestershire joined **Operation Recall** earlier this year in a bid to more effectively tackle this issue. The aim of this is to increase awareness, educate, and effectively deal with those who's dogs are not under suitable control.

The team have recently issued a conditional caution to a dog owner who's dog chased a horse causing unnecessary distress to both the horse, and owner of the horse. Numerous dog owners have received an educational input from officers, as well as voluntary dog control orders.

As always the advice to dog owners is to keep their dogs on a lead around livestock, stick to the public footpaths, to ensure that their dog is secure within their garden/ home environment, and to report incidents of livestock worrying.

#### Heritage Crime week of action

You may not be aware but as the Rural Policing Team, we are also responsible for the investigation of Wildlife crime, and heritage crime. Some of the team have recently completed their Heritage Training to further their knowledge.

Supporting the team, we have a number of volunteers each with a passion for history. They are invested in visiting sites, and providing crime prevention.

We encourage the public to be vigilant, and report suspicious activity utilising 101 or report online.

Remember, historical artifacts are irreplicable. Once they're gone, they're gone.



#### Mounted volunteers

It has been just over a year since the launch of our mounted volunteer's. Our volunteers act as the eyes and ears out in the community, patrolling some of the harder to reach areas. They are a key part of Operation Snaffle, have been involved in the Driver of the

Year event with Saint Gobain and XPO Logistics UK educating drivers. They have assisted the team at local events, engaged with land owners, offered tack marking at yards and equine shows. They have collectively completed over 670 hours volunteering since January 2024.
